

What are income taxes? And what are they for?

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Where does the U.S. budget come from and what is it spent on? Approximately \$1.48 trillion of the \$3.8 trillion federal budget comes from income taxes from individuals. In the winter of 2016, CUP collaborated with Julia Joseph's 11th grade U.S. History class at the International Community High School in the Bronx to learn about income taxes and investigate the funding of local, state, and federal governments.

To investigate, students participated in a scavenger hunt to find signs of tax funded programs in their neighborhood, surveyed community members about income taxes, and imagined ways government funding could be different. This booklet is a guide to what they discovered.

WHAT ARE INCOME TAXES?

Income

is money recieved through work, gifts, inheritance, etc.

Tax

is a fee paid to local, state, or federal governments to support government programs and activities.

Government


Individual Income Tax

is a percentage of money a person has to pay the government based on the amount of money they earned or recieved.















ARE ALL TAXES EQUAL?

The amount of money taken out of a paycheck for income taxes in New York State varies based on how much money that person makes. This is called a progressive tax.



If you make \$25,000 or less in 1 year, then you pay a maximum of 28% in income taxes to the government, but you may not pay anything at all.



If you make \$75,000 or more in 1 year, then you pay a minimum of 45% in income taxes to the government.

The fee paid to local, state, or federal governments increases as the taxable amount, such as income, increases. The more money you make the more income taxes you pay.

*percentages are based on the tax rate for a single individuals total income in 2015.
