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
Goal: Use objects in your home to create a museum display that tells a story about you.

Guiding Question: What do the objects in our homes say about us?

Steps:

Materials:
Paper
Pens/ Pencils/ Markers
Objects around you

Observe: Look for patterns and similarities among objects in your home. You might consider similarities in color, pattern, shape, material, etc. Play around with how to arrange the objects.



Use paper and a pen/ marker to create a label for your display. Most museum labels follow this format:

Artist Name

where the artist is from, year they were born

Title

year work was made list of materials used or objects included


Short text description goes here. Give more information and answer any questions viewers might have. This description can include quotes from the artist or other information about their life.



Place the label next to your display.




Create a new display!
